3. Resolution to Authorize the Purchase of TruNarc Handheld Narcotics Analyzers for the Sheriff's Department with Opioid Litigation Settlement Funds – Randy Scholz/Curt Dutton
Dutton was not able to attend the meeting so the Sheriff explained this resolution.

Hakes explained this initiative was put in motion before he started here and Dutton did the research. The devices can detect Fentanyl. Mail coming in to the jail is a good example of this potential exposure. Using this device will help keep staff safe. Hakes is not sure how much calibration needs to be done with the unit.

Scholz explained this meets the requirements so we can use the Opioid settlement funds. The device uses a laser that goes through plastic so you don't have to open up the package. New software is downloaded as needed. This will not be hosted on our network. If approved, this will allow the Sheriff's Department to have one analyzer on each patrol shift and one in the jail.

Hakes explained the County has universal kits (Narcan) in the jail and evidence room and available in other locations as well when evidence comes in.

Scholz explained there is a reporting element when using the Opioid settlement funds. However, we

1. Resolution to Reauthorize Payment of American Rescue Plan Act Funding to Bloomer Telephone Company for a Broadband Expansion Project in the Towns of Eagle Point, Lafayette and Tilden – Randy Scholz/Travis McFarlane
McFarlane explained they didn't receive the full PSC grant funds so they prepared a revised proposal. They did get one of the projects approved from the original request. They will be working in Hallie and Seymour for that part. They are requesting the remainder of the funds from Chippewa County in the amount of \$295,232. They are proposing 129 locations, 22+ miles of fiber for a total cost of \$800,000 with Bloomer Telephone's commitment of \$500,000. They have the majority of the materials and a commitment from contractors to complete the work in 2023. When this project is done, then Lafayette will be served by broadband. In Tilden, they will be down to less than 20 homes that don't have broadband.

1. Prior to 1/1/2022, Chippewa County was fully insured and our carrier was Security Health Plan (SHP)
2. Effective 1/1/2022, Chippewa County moved to a self funded health insurance plan model
 - a. Third Party Administrator = AmeriBen
 - b. Plan Network = Anthem Blue Preferred
 - c. Rx Vendor = IngenioRx (now CarelonRx)
3. Benefits of self funding model
 - a. More plan design flexibility
 - b. Access to claims data
 - c. Pharmacy benefit design flexibility
 - d. In "good claims experience years" the County will reap the savings, not the fully insured carrier.

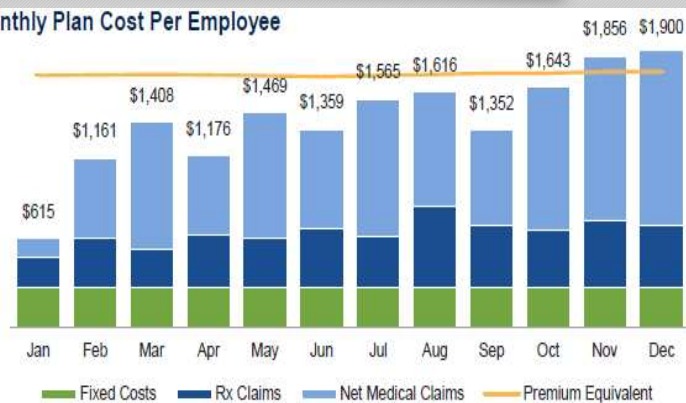

Advanced Primary Care Clinic – ReforMedicine

What is it?

“Advanced Primary Care is a practice that shifts the focus of primary care toward quality vs. quantity.”

- Instead of focusing on numbers, the provider ensures patients are provided with high-quality care that allows your doctor or nurse to be free of traditional time constraints due to requirements to see high volumes of patients.
- It is considered Patient Centered Care and focuses on the whole person. It emphasizes the patient-provider relationship with longer appointments and empathetic listening that leads to better outcomes and finding out what the true, underlying issues are and allows time to discuss how to proactively help the patient.

Advanced Primary Care Clinic – ReforMedicine

*** Starting March 15, 2023**

- The County Administrator has signed a contract with ReforMedicine to be our Advanced Primary Care Clinic and if the clinic is used, it will replace the “fees for service” model with a monthly per member fee effective March 15, 2023.
 - Employees still have the option to continue receiving care from their current provider if they choose.
- Services provided by ReforMedicine will be free to County employees and their dependents who are on Chippewa County’s health plan. No additional funds/levy is needed to implement this in FY23 due to plan savings in the following areas:
 - Laboratory costs
 - Medical claims for office, preventative care, sports physicals, urgent care and ER visits
 - Generic prescriptions and immunizations
 - Avoidance of hospitalization and unnecessary testing
 - Diabetes management and weight loss management
- ReforMedicine has opened a new clinic location in Lake Hallie. Employees may schedule an appointment at any of the ReforMedicine locations (Eau Claire, Menomonie, Hudson or Chippewa Falls).
- Informational meetings are scheduled for February to allow our employees and their spouses to meet the physicians and learn more about the clinic.

Advanced Primary Care Clinic – ReforMedicine

Why would we consider it?

“Chippewa County wants to invest in the health of their employees!”

- Focus is on high-quality care NOT quantity of visits per day
- Longer visits (30-60 minutes) so you have time to discuss all of your concerns to achieve better overall health and outcomes
- Accessibility is almost immediate both in-person or virtually (same day or next day appointments)
- Healthy employees:
 - Improves productivity and reduces absenteeism
 - Reduces medical leave, work related injuries and turnover
 - Reduces medical / Rx costs
 - Improves employee engagement and satisfaction
- Strong local references: Several local organizations contracting with ReforMedicine have told us it has been a huge success. ReforMedicine has improved health care outcomes and cut costs, both for the employees and the organization.
- They will assist in referrals to Centers of Excellence (COE) providers
- Save the County and employees money

How would it affect members (employees and their dependents on Chippewa County’s health plan)?

- ReforMedicine will offer all primary care services free to members including preventative care visits, annual cancer screenings, physicals, stitches, chronic disease management (such as diabetes, high blood pressure or asthma), office or urgent care visits and treatment for sinus infections, pink eye, skin tag removal, and more.
- ReforMedicine offers a medical weight-loss program that will be free to members.
- ReforMedicine will provide immunizations and lab work free to members.
- ReforMedicine will provide a wide variety of generic prescription options at a reduced cost to the member.
- ReforMedicine will provide care for all age ranges, including pediatrics.
- ReforMedicine offers access to multiple locations with same or next day appointments available.

*** NEW POLICY *****Advance Primary Care Clinic Health Reimbursement Account (HRA) Incentive****a. Purpose**

The County recognizes that creating a healthy workplace is about providing an environment and opportunities for a healthy workplace and healthy lifestyle. An important part of this is providing health care options that are accessible, affordable, and focused on high-quality care.

Effective March 15, 2023, Chippewa County will contract with ReforMedicine to provide Advanced Primary Care Clinic services to our employees and their dependents. This is an exciting new initiative that is anticipated to improve health care outcomes and cut costs, both for the employees and the organization.

The purpose of the policy is to provide an incentive to employees and spouses enrolled in Chippewa County's health plan to attend, or listen to, an introductory meeting regarding the Advanced Primary Care Clinic (ReforMedicine) and also to schedule and attend an initial appointment with ReforMedicine.

This incentive does not obligate employees or spouses to continue using ReforMedicine after the initial appointment. Employees are not required to make a change in their health care provider or specialty care provider, unless they choose to do so. Chippewa County wants to offer employees and spouses, with Chippewa County's health plan, the opportunity to learn about other health care options available to them and empower employees to make informed decisions going forward.

This incentive is a limited time offer to encourage utilization. Employees will need to meet the incentive requirement by November 1, 2023 in order to be eligible. This policy will be eliminated on January 31, 2024.

b. Incentive Eligibility

All employees enrolled in Chippewa County's health plan that meet the requirements of the policy shall be eligible for the incentive. This includes current employees enrolled at the time of this policy's effective date, as well as new employees who enroll and meet all of the requirements of the policy.

c. Health Reimbursement Account (HRA) Incentive Amount

Employees with single coverage or full family coverage with employee and children only (no spouse) are eligible to receive \$250 into their HRA account in January 2024, if the criteria in (d) are met.

Employees with family coverage and a spouse on the plan are eligible to receive \$500 into their HRA account in January 2024, if the criteria in (d) are met.

d. Payment Criteria

1. Informational Meeting:

Employees with single coverage or full family coverage with employee and children only (no spouse) shall either attend one of the live informational meetings provided in 2023 by Dr. Usher from ReforMedicine, or watch a recorded version of the informational meeting via the County's Learning Management System (Local Gov U) to learn about the advanced primary care clinic, the services they offer and the benefits of utilizing the clinic.

Employees with family coverage and a spouse on the plan shall require both the employee and spouse to attend the live informational meeting, or view a recorded version. The employee is required to either attend one of the live informational meetings provided in 2023 by Dr. Usher from ReforMedicine or watch a recorded version of the informational meeting via the County's Learning Management System (Local Gov U) to learn about the advanced primary care clinic, the services they offer and the benefits of the utilizing the clinic. Upon request to the Human Resources Division, the employee's spouse may listen to a recorded version via YouTube.

Employees and spouses who attend the live meeting shall be required to sign in at the meeting with a member of the Human Resources Division to confirm their attendance at the meeting. Spouses shall indicate who their spouse is on the sign up. Employees and spouses who watch the video shall be required to complete and pass a quiz related to the content in the video. The employee's quiz shall be administered through the Learning Management System (Local Gov U) and the spouse's quiz shall be submitted as a hard copy or emailed to be scored and retained by the Human Resources Division.

All eligibility requirements including attendance at a live meeting, watching the video and taking a quiz, shall be completed and/or submitted to the Human Resources Division by November 1, 2023 in order to be eligible for the HRA incentive.

2. ReforMedicine Appointment:

Employees with single coverage or full family coverage with employee and children only (no spouse) shall schedule and attend a 30 to 60-minute appointment with a physician at any of the ReforMedicine locations available.

Employees with family coverage and a spouse on the plan: Both the employee and spouse shall schedule and attend a 30 to 60-minute appointment with a physician at any of the ReforMedicine locations available.

To receive the HRA incentive amount, the appointment shall be on or before November 1, 2023.

ReforMedicine will provide Chippewa County with a report on or after November 2, 2023 that provides a list of employees and dependent spouses who scheduled and attended their appointment. Employees are not required to provide proof of the visit.

e. HRA Payment Processing

HRA contributions shall be deposited into the employees' HRA accounts if both the informational meeting and ReforMedicine appointment criteria are met. The deposits shall be made during the Q1 2024 HRA deposit for all employees and spouses who meet the November 1, 2023 deadline for both the informational meeting and the appointment.

f. Policy Termination

This policy shall be eliminated on January 31, 2024.



STATEMENT OF EXPLANATION

Resolution No. 08 - 23

RES. 08-23: RESOLUTION TO REQUEST THAT THE STATE REVISE THE CURRENT REAL ESTATE TRANSFER FEES REVENUE SHARING FORMULA TO A 50/50 SHARE WITH COUNTIES - MELANIE MCMANUS

Prior to 1981 and pursuant to Wisconsin Statutes § 77.22, a real estate transfer fee was imposed at the rate of \$.10/\$100 of value and under Wisconsin Statutes § 77.24, the collected fees were divided equally, with 50% going to the State and 50% to the County. In 1981, the real estate transfer fee law changed to impose a real estate transfer fee at the rate of \$.30 per \$100 of value. The division of the transfer fees also changed to 80% to the State, with 20% being retained by the County.

Under this 1981 calculation, the County would receive additional monies due to the increase in rate, despite receiving a lesser percentage. The following example is illustrative:

Under the 50/50 split on a sale of \$100,000 at \$.10 per \$100, the County would retain \$50 of the \$100 transfer fee collected. Under the current 80/20 split on a sale of \$100,000 at the \$.30 per \$100, the County would retain \$60 of the \$300 transfer fee collected.

Property values have increased significantly since 1981 and the State has accrued a significant budget surplus. If the formula for sharing real estate transfer fees were to be changed back to the 50/50 division, it could provide Chippewa County with over \$300,000 per year of additional revenue based on figures from the past 5 years. Passage of this resolution would request the State to revise the current real estate transfer fees sharing formula from the current 80/20 split back to the pre-1981 50/50 split.

Resolution No. 08 - 23

**RES. 08-23: RESOLUTION TO REQUEST THAT THE STATE REVISE THE CURRENT REAL ESTATE
TRANSFER FEES REVENUE SHARING FORMULA TO A 50/50 SHARE WITH COUNTIES - MELANIE
MCMANUS**

WHEREAS, the collection of real estate transfer fee by counties was mandated by the State of Wisconsin in 1969, and included a requirement that counties remit 50% of all transfer fees collected to the State; and

WHEREAS, in 1981 the State changed the transfer fee formula to require counties to remit 80% of all transfer fees collected to the State; and

WHEREAS, the County, through the Register of Deeds Office, assumes the annual operating costs of recording all real estate transfers occurring in each county, including the collection of real estate transfer fees; and

WHEREAS, Chippewa County real estate transfer fee collections over the past five years totaled \$5,442,620.08, of which the County retained \$1,088,852.16 and \$4,353.767.92 was remitted to the State; and

WHEREAS, using the pre-1981, 50/50 split of the real estate transfer fees, Chippewa County's share of the fees collected on local real estate transfers during that same five-year period would have provided an additional \$1,632,457.88 in support of local government; and

WHEREAS, as of 2021, the State of Wisconsin had built up a budget surplus of approximately \$2.5 billion dollars, while many Wisconsin counties have continued to struggle financially due to the ever-increasing cost of providing county government services in an inflationary economy along with the financial restrictions imposed by State imposed levy limits; and

WHEREAS, revising the formula for the sharing of real estate transfer fees from the current 80/20 State/County share back to the pre-1981 formula of 50/50 State/County share would provide much needed revenue to counties struggling with budgets constrained by levy limits;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Chippewa County Board of Supervisors does hereby urge the State of Wisconsin to revise the real estate transfer fee share formula to again allow Wisconsin counties to retain 50% of all real estate transfer fees collected, with 50% to be remitted to the State; and

BE FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be sent to Governor Tony Evers, all members of the State Legislature representing Chippewa County, the Wisconsin Counties

Association, and all other Wisconsin Counties.

Forwarded to the County Board by the Executive Committee.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

There is no fiscal impact to Chippewa County by passage of this resolution.

WITH OPIOID LITIGATION SETTLEMENT FUNDS - CURT DUTTON**

1 Passage of this resolution will approve the purchase of four TruNarc Handheld Narcotics
2 Analyzers, at a cost of approximately \$31,000 each, for the Sheriff's Department. These devices
3 would be purchased with settlement funds that Chippewa County has received from the
4 national opioid litigation settlements with a manufacturer and distributor. The opioid
5 settlement requires that all settlement funds be used for opioid abuse abatement and purchase
6 of the TruNarc devices would qualify as an authorized use.

7 These handheld devices can detect and identify 498 different narcotics within seconds.
8 The library of narcotics that can be detected by the devices is continuously updated to include
9 emerging drug threats. The library of detectable substances is attached.

RES. 09-23: RESOLUTION TO AUTHORIZE THE PURCHASE OF TRUNARC HANDHELD NARCOTICS ANALYZERS FOR THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT WITH OPIOID LITIGATION SETTLEMENT FUNDS - CURT DUTTON

WHEREAS, across the United States, law enforcement agencies have seen a substantial spike in the presence of fentanyl and carfentanil; and

WHEREAS, fentanyl is a powerful synthetic opioid that is similar to morphine, but is 50 to 100 times more potent and physical contact with or inhalation of fentanyl powder can be deadly as a lethal dose of fentanyl is approximately the size of three grains of salt; and

WHEREAS, patrol officers in Chippewa County routinely find fentanyl on the street and jail officers in Chippewa County have also found fentanyl in the incoming inmate mail; and

WHEREAS, the following is the amount of fentanyl seized by the West Central Drug Task for our region from 2016-2022:

2016	0 grams
2017	.1 grams
2018	.5 grams
2019	1.1 grams
2020	83.52 grams
2021	46.64 grams
2022	352.97 grams; and

WHEREAS, to protect county law enforcement officers from these dangerous narcotics, the Chippewa County Sheriff's Office has made a request to purchase 4 TruNarc Handheld Narcotics Analyzers, which are portable handheld analyzing devices that are capable of testing for 498 different narcotics, including fentanyl and all fentanyl variants from a safe distance by the use of a focused wavelength laser; and

WHEREAS, these devices have the capability to scan through packaging, including glass and plastic containers, which makes it safer for law enforcement officers to determine the identity of unknown substances without inadvertent exposure; and

WHEREAS, the TruNarc Handheld Narcotics Analyzers cost approximately \$31,000 each and therefore the cost for 4 units would be approximately \$125,000; and

WHEREAS, as part of the ongoing national Opioid Litigations, Chippewa County has recently begun receiving settlement funds from the initial settlements involving a manufacturer and distributors of opioids; and

WHEREAS, the initial settlements with the manufacturer and distributors is expected to total up to approximately \$1.9 million for Chippewa County and as of December 31, 2022, Chippewa County has received \$330,609.83; and

WHEREAS, any use of those settlement funds must be for opioid abuse abatement, prevention and treatment; and

WHEREAS, purchase of the TruNarc Handheld Narcotics Analyzers would be an appropriate use of the Opioid Litigation settlement funds; and

WHEREAS, the Legal and Law Enforcement Committee supports the purchase of (4) TruNarc Handheld Narcotics Analyzers;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the County Board does hereby authorize the Chippewa County Sheriff's Department to use Opioid Litigation settlement funds to purchase four (4) TruNarc Handheld Narcotics Analyzers to help reduce opioid abuse in Chippewa County.

Forwarded to the County Board by the Executive Committee.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

For the 2023 Budget, \$93,194 was budgeted for Opioid Mitigation Expenses. Opioid Abatement Account fund balance for 2022 is \$300,609.83. With the purchase of four (4) Tru Narc Handheld Narcotics Analyzers, an estimated \$125,000 will be utilized from the Opioid Abatement Account (Fund 233). The difference will be funded with Opioid Abatement Account fund balance from 2022.

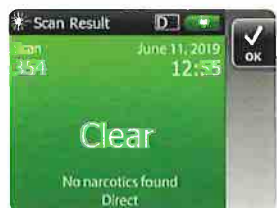

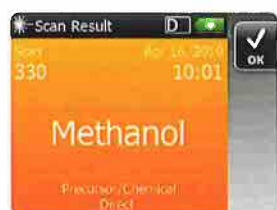

Resolution No. 06 - 23

RES. 06-23: RESOLUTION TO AUTHORIZE THE USE OF AMERICAN RESCUE ACT FUNDING FOR THE CONTAMINATE MITIGATION IN RESIDENTIAL WELLS PROJECT - RANDY SCHOLZ AND LYNDIA SCHWEIKERT

The American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) of 2021 is a \$1.9 trillion Economic Stimulus Package that was signed into law by President Biden on March 11, 2021. This Act appropriates direct payments to state, local, territorial and tribal governments. The payments allocated for counties are based on populations of all counties across the nation. The American Rescue Plan Act has four allowable areas of usage:

- A. To respond to the public health emergency with respect to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) or its negative economic impacts, including assistance to households, small businesses and nonprofits or aid to impacted industries such as tourism, travel and hospitality;
- B. To respond to workers performing essential work during the COVID-19 public health emergency by providing premium pay to eligible workers;
- C. For the provision of government services to the extent of the reduction in revenue of such metropolitan city, non-entitlement unit of local government or county due to the COVID-19 public health emergency relative to revenues collected in the most recent full fiscal year of the metropolitan city, non-entitlement unit of government or county prior to the emergency; and
- D. Make necessary investments in water, sewer or broadband infrastructure.

Chippewa County's total allocation is estimated at \$12,559,059 and is to be used for any of the four allowable areas of usage as set out above.

Passage of this resolution will authorize the use of \$250,000 of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding for the Land Conservation & Forest Management Department for the Contaminate Mitigation in Residential Wells project for 2023 through 2024. This nitrate remediation project will benefit the citizens of Chippewa County by improving the quality of the groundwater, while maintaining a productive agriculture industry.

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2021 President Biden signed into law a \$1.9 Trillion economic stimulus package called the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA); and

WHEREAS, ARPA provides direct payments to state, local, territorial and tribal governments; and

WHEREAS, ARPA provides direct payments to all counties across the United States according to each county's population in relation to the total population of all such counties; and

WHEREAS, ARPA has four allowable areas of usage: negative economic impacts due to the public health emergency with respect to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19); premium pay to eligible workers performing essential work during the COVID-19 public health emergency; provision for reduction in revenue for county; and to make necessary investments in water, sewer or broadband infrastructure; and

WHEREAS, Chippewa County's estimated total allocation is \$12,559,059 from ARPA; and

WHEREAS, the Chippewa County Land Conservation & Forest Management (LCFM) Director has identified a project for Contaminate Mitigation in Residential Wells to be completed from 2023 through 2024 that could be funded with part of Chippewa County's ARPA allocation; and

WHEREAS, it is the recommendation of the LCFM Director, the County Administrator and the Finance Director that \$250,000 of ARPA funds be utilized for funding the Contaminate Mitigation in Residential Wells project with "Reduction in Revenue" being the allowable use as defined in the Final Rule released by the U.S. Treasury; and

WHEREAS, the Contaminate Mitigation in Residential Wells project benefits the citizens of Chippewa County by improving the quality of the groundwater, while maintaining a productive agriculture industry; and

WHEREAS, these funds would be transferred from the American Rescue Plan Act funds (Fund 235) to the LCFM Groundwater Study account (100-52-57418) on at least an annual basis and upon the completion of the Contaminate Mitigation in Residential Wells project; and

WHEREAS, by March of 2024, any ARPA funds allocated to a project that is not expected

to be completed within the allotted timeframe may be redirected to other projects; and

WHEREAS, before reallocating any ARPA funds that are not used within the prescribed timeframes, the County Administrator will bring a resolution to the Executive Committee and County Board for approval as to how those funds will be used; and

WHEREAS, the Executive Committee reviewed this project on July 5, 2022 and recommends that the Contaminate Mitigation in Residential Wells project be completed with the ARPA funds; and

WHEREAS, the attached document sets out the history of this project and the plan of implementation going forward;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Chippewa County Board of Supervisors does hereby approve the utilization of \$250,000 of the American Rescue Plan Act funding to the Land Conservation & Forest Management Department for the Contaminate Mitigation in Residential Wells project in 2023 through 2024; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that these funds be transferred from the American Rescue Plan Act fund (Fund 235) to the LCFM Groundwater Study account (100-52-57418) on at least an annual basis and upon completion of the Contaminate Mitigation in Residential Wells project.

Forwarded to the County Board by the Executive Committee.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The American Rescue Plan Act (Fund 235) will be reduced by \$250,000 in 2023 through 2024.

History

- 1971 – “Report on Preserving & Improving the Quality of Air, Land & Water Resources”
 - Stating Nitrogen in groundwater is becoming a problem.
- 1985 – Baseline groundwater sampling occurred on 715 wells by Chippewa County LCD (12% exceeded 10mg/l).
- 2007 – Retesting of groundwater of 800 wells by Chippewa County LCD (12.3 % exceeded 10 mg/l).
- 2016 – Retesting of groundwater of 744 wells by UW-Stevens Point (18.3% exceeded 10 mg/l).
- 2022 –Retesting 200 of the wells in high nitrate area to determine rate and source of contamination by UW-Stevens Point.
- 2/16/2022 – LCFM motion “to allocate \$500,000 in ARPA funding to enhance testing programs, compile data, and come up with a demonstration site program: Schmitt/Steele. Motion carried by voice vote.”
- Kevin Masarik, UW Stevens Point Groundwater Education Specialist, presented at the March 16, 2022, LCFM meeting and stated that additional testing would not help. Chippewa County has the data necessary to identify the problem – Nitrogen applications on corn over sandstone. Committee consensus to shift focus to mitigation efforts.
- Discussed with Mark Borchardt, Research Microbiologist at USDA-ARS, (Lead Researcher on Kewaunee & SWIGG Studies) – Stated additional testing was not necessary, should focus on bedrock and source areas).
- Discussed with Ken Bradbury, Director of WI Geological & Natural History Survey – Stated we already have ModFlow created for Chippewa County. This is a groundwater flow program, used to identify source areas for protection.
- Discussed with Ken Genskow, UW Professor Environmental Planning & Policy – Recommended looking into community water refill stations as a short-term solution in addition to long term mitigation.
- Discussed with Chris Clayton, WI DNR Agricultural Runoff Section Chief – Lead the efforts for the State of Wisconsin to establish a Nitrate Standard and rules to prevent future contamination. While the rule did not pass, several tools were developed to help counties facilitate nitrogen reduction programs. The map and several mitigation recommendations will be utilized in this program.

Implementation Plan (*Items in italics are in progress or completed*)

- A. Community Water Refill Stations - Drill 3-5 wells in the affected communities to provide water free of nitrates for cooking and drinking in the interim while working on a prevention strategy for the future.
 1. *Received approval from County Board to form Ad Hoc Committee for identifying locations for Community Refill Stations.*
 2. *Sent application to townships, professionals, and associations for selection of Ad Hoc Committee.*
 3. *Working with DNR to identify existing permitted wells that may be utilized as refill stations.*
 4. Will work with townships to identify oversight for refill stations.
 5. Will research types of reusable receptacles to place in home and fill up at stations.
 6. Will develop information to provide at Kiosks at sites.
- B. Work with agronomists/operators/economic development to promote widespread cover crop use in nitrogen sensitive areas.
 - a. *In Progress*
 - i. *Received applications for 2162 Acres (27 applications).*
 - ii. *Contracted 869 Acres (10 producers) for 4 years.*
 - iii. *Collected water samples from 10 wells ranging from 2.6 mg/l to 18.8 mg/l.*
 - iv. *Collected soil health samples from 10 farms (currently in process).*
 - v. *Completed 10 whole farm assessments and developing implementation plans*

 - a. *No-till was promoted and majority utilized this practice for seeding.*

Utilization of ARPA funds would allow us to give every full-time and part-time employee \$200 for every 5-year milestone anniversary missed as laid out in our Longevity Bonus Policy. Here are two examples: 1) If an employee was here for 21 years, they would receive \$800. (\$200 X 4 missed milestone bonuses) 2) If an employee was here for 11 years, they would receive \$400. (\$200 X 2 missed milestone bonuses) We are anticipating to utilize interest from ARPA funds for most, if not all, of this one-time initiative.
